

Additional Horse Activities

Trail Rides

Every riding group at Camp Jewell is guaranteed at least one trail ride. Some riding groups may opt for additional trail rides instead of lessons as well. Trail rides in camp may go through our pine covered “Back 40 Acres”, over rustic footbridges around our Sunrise Mountain, go up and down small rolling hills of our “Torch Loop” or up and down the more vigorous hills between main camp and Hide-A-Way Ranch. A favorite trail ride opportunity for most is splashing through the water by our covered bridge.



Vaulting

Vaulting is best described as gymnastics on horseback. A group of vaulters shares one horse that is worked on the lunge line. Before campers vault on a live horse, they will warm-up and practice on a stationary barrel horse. Camp Jewell will give Ranchers an introduction to recreational vaulting. Campers are not required to wear helmets because spotters are always present and the horses are always kept at a walk or stand still. One does not need to have any gymnastic or riding experience to vault, yet vaulting is a FUN, safe way to relax, synchronize with the horse, and gain balance and confidence. To read more visit
